WOVE Legislative Update for Career and Technical Education

2024 Legislative Session | February 23, 2024

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This week the House and Senate released their versions of the supplemental operating and capital budgets. These documents came out very similar in size and scope, but with some differences which is always expected. The budget documents can be <u>viewed here</u> under the "Latest Budget proposals" tab. And the new supplemental spending package from the House by agency detail can be viewed <u>here</u>. Starting on Pages 199-204 you will see the public schools' portion.

The Leage of Education Voters put out a great side-by-side comparison of the House and Senate budgets. These figures are not final, but simply a snapshot of the first versions of the budgets and how they compare as it relates to education spending. <u>See that document here.</u>

Bill Highlights

SB 5882 - Increasing prototypical school staffing to better meet student needs

This bill increases staff allocations for teaching assistants, office support staff, and noninstructional aides in the prototypical school funding model.

This bill would inject \$49 million into the K-12 system for non-certificated staff over the 2024-2025 fiscal year. The bill also comes with a projected price tag of \$130M in the 2025 budget and \$134M in the 2027 budget. Budget writers have already inserted the line item into the budget to fund the passage of this bill, which is expected by both sides of the aisle.

HB 2236 - Expanding and strengthening career and technical education core plus programs

Our Core Plus bill cleared another milestone this past week as it had a positive hearing on February 19 with a subsequent vote out of committee on February 21. The bill has been referred to Senate Ways and Means where it needs to be heard and voted out by Monday, February 26. Everything seems to be on track to get this bill to the Senate floor before sine di, but Ways and Means is never a given.

2024 Session Cutoff Calendar

February 26, 2024	Last day to read in opposite house committee reports (pass bills out of committee and read them into the record on the floor) from House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
March 1, 2024*	Last day to consider (pass) opposite house bills (5 p.m.) (except initiatives and alternatives to initiatives, budgets and matters necessary to implement budgets, differences between the houses, and matters incident to the interim and closing of the session).
March 7, 2024	Last day allowed for regular session under state constitution.

* After 5:00pm on the 54th day, only initiatives, alternatives to initiatives, budgets and matters necessary to implement budgets, matters that affect state revenue, messages pertaining to amendments, differences between the houses, and matters incident to the interim and closing of the session may be considered.
