Week number four (4) saw some energy around the CTE funding/distribution calculation thanks to the work of the Washington STEM Networks advocacy efforts last Thursday in Olympia. The CTE funding/distribution calculation has a strong emphasis in the [Washington STEM's Legislative Priorities](#). I was invited to brief the group last Wednesday on how we arrived at the CTE funding issue and the options we have to resolve the reduction of CTE funding due to take place this coming fall.

As a result, I have been receiving inquiries by members and staff to meet to learn more and discuss what are the possible solutions. What can you do to help move us to a solution? Reach out to your legislative members and make them aware of the problem for your local programs this coming fall; share an email, set up a meeting with the member as soon as you can, and if you like you can refer them to me for further details and/or follow up. While we can thank Washington STEM for helping us out and having a very positive affect last week, it is up to all of us to "pick up the ball" and do all we can in advocating for our programs now that we have several members' attention. If you need help in reaching out let me know how I can assist. Stay tuned and be ready to respond as we go forward in the next four and a half weeks.

Another key bill from last week with direct implications for CTE is [HB 2311 - Reducing barriers to student participation in extracurricular activities](#) would limit the fees charged to some students for student identification cards and participation in extracurricular activities and career and technical student organizations; require school districts and private schools to communicate the fee limits widely, effectively, and frequently; create a grant program to subsidize small school districts unduly impacted by the extracurricular activities fee limits; and limit the frequency of physical examinations required for participation in extracurricular activities. On face-value, there are opportunities and direct challenges, as written, for CTSOs. As the bill progresses it will be important for school districts, CTE directors, and CTSO advisors to weigh in on these with the Legislature. The bill passed out of the House on Thursday and will head to the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee for further discussion.

In last week's *WOVE* I asked to hear your thoughts on the bill and received three emails from folks asking their questions and sharing their thoughts. I am sure if this bill is still in process on Civic Engagement Day on the 15th it will be an important point of conversation in office visits that day.

REMINDER: The CTSO state officers and their state advisors will host the annual Civic Engagement Day in Olympia this year on February 15 beginning with a "pre-briefing" from 8-9 a.m. at the Hotel RL in Olympia (formally known as the Red Lion). The state officers will be manning displays during the day under the Dome on the 3rd floor. If you have CTSO students and advisors planning on attending and would like more information I suggest you/they contact their state advisor or executive secretary for their individual organizations.

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HOUSE BILLS

House Bill 1246: Concerning school bus safety

Substitute requires that every school bus manufactured or assembled after September 1, 2019, be equipped with a shoulder harness-type safety belt assembly for each passenger position.

House Bill 1325: Concerning the evaluation and prioritization of capital budget projects at the public two-year and four-year institutions of higher education

Substitute merges language from two related statutes regarding the scoring and prioritization processes of higher education capital projects.

House Bill 1508: Promoting student health and readiness through meal and nutrition programs

The amendment clarifies that breakfast after the bell programs, including the provision of breakfast, is not intended to be included within the definition or funding of the program of basic education under Article IX of the state Constitution. Includes this language within the definition of instructional hours. Removes the requirement that breakfast items served in a breakfast after the bell program contain less than 25 percent, by weight, added sugar. Requires the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to develop and distribute best practices and provide technical assistance on strategies for selecting food items that are low in added sugar by December 1, 2018. Removes the word "organic" to describe gardens, which is a type of innovative school-based program that may receive a grant.

House Bill 2311: Reducing barriers to student participation in extracurricular activities

The amendment makes the maximum fee limit for participation in Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO) applicable only to students eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals (FRPM) program; (2) Specifies that the maximum fee limitations do not apply to admission fees for events or the purchase of supplies required to participate in extracurricular activities or CTOS; (3) Changes the purpose of the PLAY grant to subsidizing small school districts unduly impacted by student identification card fee limits, rather than extracurricular activities participation fee limits; (4) Reduces the maximum grant award per school district to two thousand, rather than five thousand, dollars per year; and (5) Changes the organization required to contract with the Washington Interscholastic Activities Association (WIAA) for administration of the grant program from the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to the Office of Financial Management (OFM).

House Bill 2377: Eliminating certain postsecondary institutions' eligibility for state financial aid programs

Substitute prohibits the Washington Student Achievement Council from approving any new applications to participate in the state financial aid programs from any for-profit university, college, school, or institute or any not-for-profit university, college, school, or institute that was previously owned by a for-profit corporation.

House Bill 2543: Establishing regional school safety centers in educational service districts

Substitute requires the School Safety Summit participants to report to the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Legislature on the progress of implementing an effective and efficient statewide plan for school safety that meets local needs, by November 1, 2019.

House Bill 2581: Concerning the Washington achieving a better life experience program account

Substitute allows the Washington Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Governing Board to choose either an investment manager or the State Investment Board to invest the money in the Washington ABLE Program Account.

House Bill 2614: Concerning electronic ballot return

Substitute allows a non-overseas or service voter who submits a ballot electronically to submit a signed declaration to the county auditor before certification.

House Bill 2684: Defining the process for best interest determinations of students in out-of-home care

Substitute modifies requirements governing protocols developed by the Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) and school districts regarding the status and progress of foster children by replacing references to "foster children" with "children in out-of-home care," and by requiring the protocols to include additional protocols for making best interest determinations for students in out-of-home care.

House Bill 2685: Promoting pre-apprenticeship opportunities for high school students

Substitute requires the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, in consultation with the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges and the Washington State Apprenticeship and Training Council, to examine opportunities for promoting registered pre-apprenticeship and registered youth apprenticeship opportunities for high school students and report to the Governor and the Legislature by November 1, 2018.

House Bill 2686: Concerning high school and beyond plans

Substitute establishes additional minimum content requirements for High School and Beyond Plans (HSBPs). Requires school districts to provide a HSBP to students' parents or guardians in the top two non-English languages spoken by students in the district.

House Bill 2700: Concerning the handling of child forensic interview and child interview digital recordings

Substitute exempts audio and video recordings of child forensic interviews that depict or describe allegations of child abuse, child neglect, or exposure to violence from the Public Records Act except by court order upon a showing of good cause and notice to the child's guardian.

House Bill 2703: Clarifying hours and wages for education employee compensation claims

Substitute changes the eligibility for unemployment benefits for educational employees who have multiple employers.

House Bill 2748: Modifying the learning assistance program

Substitute requires school districts to expend funds appropriated for the Learning Assistance Program (LAP) in a manner consistent with the Washington Integrated Student Supports Protocol beginning January 1, 2019, and encourages districts to adopt this expenditure practices before the deadline.

House Bill 2824: Exchanging and aligning specific powers, duties, and functions of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the State Board of Education

Substitute modifies numerous powers, functions, and duties of and between the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) and the State Board of Education. Requires the OSPI to review available and appropriate options for expanding the integration of competency-based education practices in public schools and to provide a report to the education committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate by November 1, 2019.

House Bill 2848: Modifying school and court processes to promote attendance and reduce truancy

Substitute requires members of certain school boards to participate in any trauma-informed training provided to community truancy board members and to attend at least one community truancy board meeting per school year.

House Bill 2953: Regarding the school construction assistance program

Introduced by Rep. Gerry Pollet (Seattle) (D)

House Bill 2964: Concerning special education funding

Introduced by Rep. Gerry Pollet (Seattle) (D)

House Bill 2982: Concerning the Kennewick and Pasco school district regionalization factors used for compensation

Introduced by Rep. Larry Haler (Richland) (R)

SENATE BILLS

Senate Bill 6261: Modifying eligibility for state need grants

Substitute expands eligibility for the State Need Grant (SNG) to 100 percent of Median Family Income (MFI). Appropriates \$206 million for the purpose of expanding eligibility to the SNG.

Senate Bill 6578: Concerning policies for part-time faculty at institutions of higher education

Introduced by Sen. Kevin Ranker (Orcas Island) (D)

Senate Bill 6582: Concerning the criminal history of applicants to institutions of higher education

Introduced by Sen. Maralyn Chase (Shoreline) (D)

Senate Bill 6591: Revising regionalization factors for certain school districts

Introduced by Sen. Randi Becker (Eatonville) (R)

February 6, 2018	Last day to read in committee reports (pass bills out of committee and read them into the record on the floor) from House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees in house of origin.
February 14, 2018	Last day to consider (pass) bills in house of origin (5 p.m.).
February 23, 2018	Last day to read in committee reports (pass bills out of committee and read them into the record on the floor) from opposite house, except House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
February 26, 2018	Last day to read in opposite house committee reports (pass bills out of committee and read them into the record on the floor) from House fiscal committees and Senate Ways & Means and Transportation committees.
March 2, 2018*	Last day to consider (pass) opposite house bills (5 p.m.) (except initiatives and alternatives to initiatives, budgets and matters necessary to implement budgets, differences between the houses, and matters incident to the interim and closing of the session).
March 8, 2018	Last day allowed for regular session under state constitution.
