Week 11 in Review:

UPDATE: HB 1162 - Concerning high school graduation credit and pathway options

The bill failed to clear committee before cutoff on March 26. This might be the last we hear of this bill this session, but the intentions of the bill may show up in another bill(s).

BUDGET: Both Senate and House Operating budgets were heard in committee this week and weekend. Both did not include the CTSO funding we have requested, but during testimony Sen Rolfes stated that there is an amendment from Sen. Keiser returning the language from last year's supplemental budget bill. So, fingers crossed for the Senate Budget. The House budget bill still does not include the CTSO increase.

<u>Prototypical Funding Formula</u>: At this point there are no significant changes other than inflation factors to CTE funding within the budgets. So base funding will remain essentially the same.

<u>Senate Ways and Means</u>: Monday's executive session for <u>5092</u> had two amendments of great interest to CTE.

- Sen. Schoesler has submitted amending language to return the CTSO funding as passed in last year's supplemental budget. *PASSED*
- Sen. Wellman has submitted an amendment which provides a one-time payment of \$1,500 per pupil to skill centers in fiscal year 2022. Removes skill center enrollment from the relief per pupil calculation for school districts. *PASSED*

THE WEEK AHEAD:

This week will be focused on how things work out in each of the fiscal committees (Ways & Means and Appropriations). Stay tuned for an email update as we know more this week. Key dates to pay attention to are: April 2 to move bill in the opposite chamber committee and read them into the record on the floor from the fiscal committees and April 11 is the last day to pass opposite house/chamber bills from the floor, except final budgets and matters necessary to implement budget (NTIB). And, finally, the last day of session is April 25.

- <u>Bill Information</u> find bill language and information here.
- <u>Committee Calendars and Agendas</u> find out when committees meet and what is on their agenda.
- <u>Sign-Up to testify</u> share your thoughts/suggestions by declaring your intention to testify no less than an hour before the hearing begins.
 - Prepare Remote testimony is limited to two minutes in most cases, but be prepared to shorten to one minute if time slots get shortened.
- <u>Written Testimony</u> Send committee members formal written testimony or other comments up to 24-hours <u>after</u> the start of a hearing.

A Word of Caution for Working in This Process:

The WOVE Legislative Newsletter is for your information, education, and outreach.

Here are some simple guidelines in how you should properly use this information going forward. In a "virtual" world where many are working from home with school/public provided equipment it will be very important to pay attention to what is allowed when and how as we deal with this new process of advocacy.

- You may pass this information along to your home email and/or share with your administration.
- As a public employee using public resources (time, equipment, and servers) you
 may not engage in what can be considered "lobbying." This means you should not
 during the school/contract day use school phones, computers, equipment, school
 email, and any use of public servers with your personal email to make direct
 contact to lobby any legislative member, this includes their staff or any member of
 the public that you are directing to vote in a certain way or take on any lobbying
 action. Lobbying is generally described as a direct ask for action in the political
 and/or legislative process at any level (local/state/nation).

So, if you choose to be personally or professionally involved in the political process you need to do so on your own time, outside the contract day, and with your own resources and personally owned equipment.
