Teacher of the Year



Melissa Mayer
Pullman School District

The Washington ACTE Teacher of the Year Award recognizes the finest Career and Technical Education teachers at the middle/secondary school level who have demonstrated innovation in the classroom, commitment to their students, and dedication to the improvement of CTE in their institutions and communities.

Melissa Mayer has been a CTE educator for the past 14 years and truly works to embody ACTE's mission to provide educational leadership in developing a competitive workforce in her classroom and in the world around her every day. Melissa's teaching career started in Kooskia, Idaho, teaching at Clearwater Valley Junior-Senior High School from 2011-2016. Kooskia is a rural community located on the Nez Perce reservation. She taught a variety of classes to 7th-12th graders in this school including web design, computer applications, economics as well as being the BPA advisor. Starting her educational career in a community like Kooskia helped her see how CTE can help students reach new heights even when they are 80 miles away from the nearest Starbucks. In the fall of 2016, Melissa began teaching at Pullman High School (PHS). Pullman being home to Washington State University (go Cougs!) opens up a world of possibilities for students. It is great to be in a community that supports education at all levels and fosters learning at every turn. She serves as the current secretary for both WE-BAM and area 11 DECA. She is a part of her district's guiding coalition for their Professional Learning Community (PLC). Along with those duties, she is the DECA and yearbook advisor at PHS. On a personal note, Melissa has 2 children, and her youngest, who's currently a junior at PHS, wants to become a CTE teacher. Her oldest child who graduated from PHS last year has found a viable career path and passions through CTE as well. The culinary arts pathway at their high school allowed her older child to get the ServSafe certification before graduating and is currently working as a prep cook. New Teacher of the Year

Administrator of the Year

The Washington ACTE Administrator of the Year Award recognizes administrative CTE professionals at the school, district, county, or state level who have demonstrated leadership in ensuring teacher and student success and have made significant contributions toward innovative, unique, and effective Career and Technical Education programs.

Laura Jones serves as the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Director for the Pasco School District. Her career in CTE began in 1996 when she joined Pasco High School as a marketing teacher and DECA advisor. Leaving the private sector to fulfill her lifelong dream of becoming a teacher, Jones brought her industry experience into the classroom, where she taught marketing and business concepts while fostering leadership and employability skills among her students. She developed authentic projects that connected students with industry and community organizations, creating meaningful, real-world learning experiences. In addition to her teaching role, Jones took on leadership positions spearheading numerous district initiatives and projects. Her impactful work earned her recognition as the 2008 Washington State Teacher of the Year, a distinction that enabled her to elevate the importance of CTE. Jones is passionate about CTE and student leadership, having witnessed these programs' transformative impact on students' lives. As CTE Director, she values collaborating with business partners and colleagues to expand CTE opportunities and design innovative student experiences. Jones has also worked closely with college partners and educators to expand high school courses and career pathways. For instance, she collaborated with Washington State University (WSU) Tri-Cities to create the Teaching Bridge program within the district's Teaching Academy. This program allows students to work as paraeducators while completing their coursework at WSU, providing valuable real-world experience and income to support their education. As director, Jones works to remove barriers and ensure teachers feel supported to do their best work preparing students for their future. This support happens through mentoring new teachers and advisors, offering professional development, and navigating Career and Technical Student Organizations. In 2024, Jones received the Washington Family and Consumer Science Administrator of the Year award and was honored to be recognized by the Family and Consumer Science Teachers she supports. Jones envisions a future where all students can take advantage of the diverse career pathways available at Pasco School District's four soon to be six—high schools. She aims to ensure that every student graduates with a viable plan for their future.

Counseling and Career Development Professional Award

Helping develop meaningful learning objectives for individual students. Transitional site Learning Coordinator for Evergreen School District for 5 years. Worked with Businesses in the local community to develop work site opportunities for students with special needs, adjusting their individual IEPs to meet the standards and expectations of the business. Special Education Para - Evergreen School District for 17 years. Spent the majority of her time working with students, staff, local businesses, and families to help create center-based plans to help individuals thrive within their communities. Vancouver Parks and Recreation Supervisor - Access to Recreation for 17 years. Supervised 10-15 staff each summer for 17 years. Creating, organizing and implementing recreation opportunities for individuals with special needs within their community. Teaching public transportation, attending community events, such as music festivals, county fairs, swimming, gardening, cooking, visiting local libraries, and farmer markets.

In this role, she has been instrumental in bridging the gap between CTE and healthcare employment, fostering initiatives that prepare students for real-world careers in the healthcare sector. One of Meg's most notable contributions is her collaboration with Spokane Public Schools to develop the Providence Healthcare Academy in 2023. This innovative program offers high school students paid, hands-on experience in healthcare settings during the school day, enabling them to envision and pursue careers in nursing and other medical fields. The success of this initiative is evident, with several students being hired by Providence upon graduation. Meg's efforts extend beyond program development; she actively engages with local colleges and universities to create education pathways that empower employees and students alike. Her commitment to workforce development is further demonstrated through her participation in community meetings aimed at enhancing educational opportunities and career readiness.
